# First Dakota Cavalry, Company B

Herewith is given the complete roster of Company B of the First Dakota Cavalry which served in the Indian troubles from 1862 to 1865. William Tripp of Yankton was Captain of this company; John R. Wood of Elk Point, 1st Lieutenant; and T. Elwood Clarke of Vermilion, 2nd Lieutenant. (Although occupation and where enlisted are included in the Monthly South Dakotan, July 1899, only names, ages and where born are included here.)

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In 1856, when relations deteriorated between the Yankton Sioux who inhabited the lands of the Upper Missouri River Valley and encroaching white settlers, the federal government took action. To General Wm. S. Harney was relegated the duty of establishing a military fort on the Missouri River. Now a land road was needed to connect the new fort to warehouses 150 miles down river at newly-settled Sioux City. Settlements soon clustered along the primitive trail. Some became villages, then towns. Others disappeared.

Few physical remnants of the original trail remain, but its influence on the people and communities it touched lingers.
